New location. New games. New partners. New volunteers. But, we still had the brats, burgers and smoked pork plates plus live music, free kids games, horse-drawn wagon rides to the pumpkin patch, demonstrations, bake sale, craft sale and raffle sales all afternoon AND sunshine (eventually).

The new, Pioneer Park, location worked out very well; with extra room, level grounds, easy access to the city, an existing playground, permanent shelters with ample electricity, plus an on-going farmers market, an open museum complex and help from park and museum staff.

It took a lot of time and effort to make it happen, but it turned out to be a great community/family event. We set up what we could on Friday and staged the rest for Saturday. The pouring rain Saturday morning delayed final set up until about 9 AM when another RAFP miracle occurred, and the rain stopped. We ended up with a record number of attendees and profits. Both horse-draw wagons went steady all day. We gave kids over 300 pumpkins from the pumpkin patch, went through almost 160 pounds of smoked pork, ran out of baked beans and potato salad, sold all 500 Packer Game raffle tickets and wore out our volunteers. We made nearly \$13,000, enough to run the Pantry for almost a month.

A huge THANK YOU to all the folks who volunteered their time and energy to make 'The Hoedown' happen and our many sponsors who donated goods and services. Some key players were: LeRoy organized and commandeered the grilled food, Cindy organized and ran the Woman's Club bake sale, Judy and Bill organized and supervised the craft 'tent', Amy obtained and supervised games and helpers, Board members ran the smoked pork plate tent, Mike helped set all up, Marcia and Joan spent all day in the Pumpkin patch and Courtney, Linda and Dave got it all organized. Many thanks, also, to our major sponsors: CoVantage Credit Union, Nicolet National Bank, Superior Diesel, Heck Capital Investors who helped pay the bills and to WXPR, The Star Journal and the Rhinelander Tourism & Marketing Committee for their help with promotion.

We have already discussed improvements for next year (Sept. 28, 2024). A major need will be volunteers to help manage major activity areas including kids games, ticket and/or basket raffles, pork plates and craft areas. Please consider how you can help!

RAFP is home to 3 programs to address childhood food security: Weekend Food For Kids, the Hodag Food Wagon, and the Hodag Snack Attack.

Hodag Food Wagon Serves Record Numbers



Launched in 2021 in partnership with the YMCA of the Northwoods and the UW Extension FoodWlse Program, and the District of Rhinelander Library, the Hodag Food Wagon is designed to address the nutrition gap often experienced by children and youth during the summer. 12% of children and youth in Oneida County are food insecure and many rely on school breakfast and lunch.

The Hodag Food Wagon offers a weekly free bag of food without registration or income eligibility to reduce stigma and barriers to access. Our goal is food security. We focus on fun and healthy eating. For many families, a simple bag of food once a week makes a big difference.

The Rhinelander Area Food Pantry conducted a community survey of area households with children and found that the hours offered for pick up were too limited, many were not aware of the program, and households were in greater need.

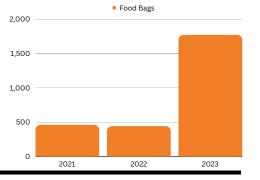
The food bags went from a lunch bag with single serve items weighing approximately 4 pounds, to a grocery bag with single serve and family size items weighing approximately 8 pounds. In addition, we focused on providing fresh produce. FoodWIse continued to be onsite and offered nutrition education and fun activities. Food bags were also made available to children and youth enrolled in the YMCA and Boys and Girls Club summer camps.

Hodag Food Wagon distribution was hosted at the District of Rhinelander Library on Thursdays from 4-6pm and bags were available at the YMCA and Boys & Girls Club summer camps. A total of 1,267 food bags plus 500 produce bags were given out in July and August. That's an average of 158 food bags every Thursday and a grand total of 1,767 bags.

WFFK Starts the School Year Strong

The Weekend Food For Kids (WFFK) program started the 2023-24 school year on September 28th with an all time high enrollment of 265 kids within the School District of Rhinelander. At the time of writing this article, enrollment has risen to 289 kids. Of course high enrollment means more food, with an average of 1,000 pounds of food sent home with the kids each week.



The program has 4 drivers on a rotation to deliver the food bags to Central, Crescent and Pelican schools: Judy Lake, LeRoy Eades, Ron Skala, and Dave Robinson. Mary Tulowitzky delivers bags to NCES and Gail Fitzgerald delivers to the YMCA 4K program.

Volunteers returning to pack the ziplock bags on Tuesdys are Joy Holquist, Helen Kuczmarski, Amber Barnes, Deb Peters, and Karen Eckert. Volunteers returning to pack the food bags on Thursdays are Karen Hall, Mari Vocke, Bev Mangerson, Judy Skala, and Paula Braun.

4H Comes to the Garden

When we give tours at the Rhinelander Area Community Garden, we start off with our mission statement. 1) We grow healthy food for our pantry customers, 2) We grow our food in an environmentally sustainable manner using no pesticides and practicing water conservation. 3) We educate our community about gardening and growing your own food.

I was fortunate to have the Oneida County 4H youth at the garden twice this summer. We talked about how our drip irrigation system conserves water. We watched bees pollinating bean flowers and learned about the importance of pollinators to our food systems. We dug in the soil and learned how microorganisms help feed our plants. Of course the youth did a bit of weeding but the highlight of the last day was sampling some of the produce. We made fresh garden salsa and sampled edible flowers. Did you know that borage flowers taste like cucumbers? I have a rule when we sample vegetables. I ask everyone to at least try it and if they don't like it they can spit it out. Guess what - not one person spit out any vegetable! The final lesson; eating a rainbow of vegetables builds healthy minds and bodies. It was the highlight of my summer and it's why I love what I do! Night on the Farm



Over fifty men, women and children came to the University of Wisconsin-Madison, Rhinelander Agricultural Research Station near Starks to pick potatoes for The Pantry. The Night on the Farm was a joint effort between the Research Farm, Rhinelander Area Food Pantry and Trig's Grocery Store.

The farm provided the machinery to bring the potatoes to the top, and the pickers filled pails after pails of potatoes which were loaded into large bins on two wagons. Many hands made fast work, as we were able to get the potatoes picked up in less than one hour. 12,000 pounds of potatoes in twelve large bins were then hauled to the farm for storage until The Pantry is ready for them. Our customers are always very appreciative of these farm potatoes! As a thank you to our pickers, the three participating groups provided hot dogs, chili, baked potato cubes and taco soup, plus other goodies for all to enjoy!

RAFP thanks all who helped with the potato picking and especially The Farm for making all of this happen. As an added thank you to the pickers, each family could go home with a bag or two of potatoes!

The rain had stopped just as we were ready to pick potatoes and the sun came out, so it was a great day on the farm!

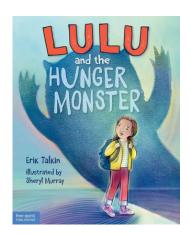

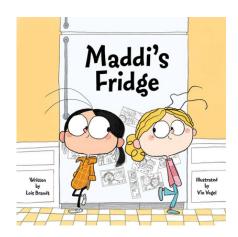


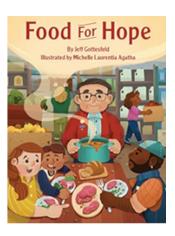
Check Out the Library!
